TRIAL TO SEPARATE FOOD AND GARDEN WASTE COLLECTIONS GETS A POSITIVE RESPONSE

A trial of separate collections of food and garden waste has concluded with residents who took part submitting positive feedback.

The six-week trial of separate food and garden waste collections involved 99 households across the borough. Overall the feedback from the majority of properties who took part in the trial found it positive and 88% would be happy for it to be introduced in the future.

Those taking part in the trial, which ended in January, were asked to leave out a 23 litre external caddy for their food waste instead of mixing in with any garden waste in wheeled bins.

COUNCIL PURCHASES SITE FOR 48 AFFORDABLE HOMES

Forty eight homes are set to be built for borough residents on the council housing waiting list after the council completed the purchase of a site.

Forty eight homes are set to be built for borough residents on the council housing waiting list after the council completed the purchase of a site.

The site in Burnt Mills Road, Basildon, was purchased for £2.5million and is currently made up of various disused outbuildings.

Eighty three on-site parking spaces will be provided for the new one and two-bed homes including visitor and disabled bays.

The new homes will be built within walking distance of nurseries, infant and primary schools, a GP and dental practice and bus and train connections serving both Pitsea and Basildon town centre.

Construction work is anticipated to start this summer.

LAINDON COMMUNITY CENTRE BUILDING HANDED BACK TO COUNCIL IN NEED OF MAJOR INVESTMENT

Basildon Council has taken over the running of the existing Laindon Community Centre site, after the keys were handed to the council by the Laindon Community Association.

Laindon Community Centre was in need of major investment before the pandemic and the current position means that even more investment is needed.

The centre is currently unable to open, mainly due to a lack of mechanical ventilation. There is also significant repair and maintenance work that needs to be undertaken for it to be in an operational condition.

Leader of Basildon Borough Council, Councillor Gavin Callaghan, said: "We thank Laindon Community Association for their best efforts in trying to manage the centre and keep it open for residents, but this hasn't been possible. For more than twenty five years there has been a chronic under-investment in the centre and there is now significant debts that the Association are unable to repay.

"Officers are currently assessing the work that needs to be undertaken in order for the Laindon Community Centre to be opened safety. The council has been dealing with the immediate issues of securing the building to the satisfaction of our insurance company.

"The building is almost 40-years-old and requires significant investment relating to compliance, fire safety, roofing/guttering and mechanical and electrical works. As a result of the pandemic too, installation of mechanical ventilation in the building is essential in order to make it a safe environment for visitors."

OVER £50,000 WORTH OF GRANTS ISSUED TO SUPPORT MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ACROSS THE BOROUGH

A mental health fund launched by Basildon Council late last year has awarded 12 organiations with grants.

The one-off grants of up to £5,000 were available to voluntary and community sector organisations to support mental health projects.

One of the grant recipients is the Craig Tyler Trust, who with the funding will launch a mobile mental health support unit.

The Leader of Basildon Council, Councillor Gavin Callaghan, added: "We launched this grant scheme to help our partners in mental health at a time when statistics showed that there could be a greater demand for mental health services over the winter.

"I'm thankful to our partners Public Health, Countryside Properties, and Mark Noble, who put our resident's mental health first by providing financial support to this great cause." PULLING TOGETHER TO 'KEEP THE LIGHTS ON' ACROSS BASILDON'S HOSPITALITY BUSINESSES

The hospitality sector has been one of the worst-hit, making up one third of the job losses caused by unemployment due to the pandemic.

Casual hospitality workers have been unable to work, ineligible for financial help from the government and have suffered a loss from tips, particularly during the festive period, which would have been their busiest time of the year.

In response to this, last December the Mayor's Charity Appeal Trust, with Basildon Council, launched the 'Keep the lights on appeal' to encourage residents and businesses to pull together and help staff within the hospitality sector across the borough, through crowdfunding donations.

The 'Keep the lights on' crowdfunding campaign, which closed on Friday 29 January, surpassed its target and raised more than £35,000, showing tremendous support for our borough's casual workers.


The outcome of the tender exercise will be discussed at a future meeting of the Neighbourhoods and Public Spaces Committee.

TO STOP FRAUD



PROTECT YOURSELF

- Avoid giving away too many personal details. Revealing your full name, date of birth and home address may lead to your identity being stolen
- Never send or receive money or give away your bank details to someone you've only met online, no matter how much you trust them or believe their story
- Pick a reputable dating website and use the site's messaging service. Fraudsters want to quickly switch to social media or texting so there's no evidence of them asking you for money.

SPOT THE SIGNS

- You've struck up a relationship with someone online; they're asking a lot of personal questions about you, but they're not interested in telling you much about themselves
- They invent a reason to ask for your help, using the emotional attachment you've built with them. Your relationship with them may often depend on you sending money
- Their pictures are too perfect they may have been stolen from an actor or model. Reverse image search can find photos that have been taken from somewhere else.

HOW IT HAPPENS

Most accounts on dating websites are genuine people looking for romance, but fraudsters may try to contact you by making fake profiles.

They may have arranged to visit you but need money to pay for the flight or visa. They may tell you everything has been booked but their ticket has been stolen, and you need to send money quickly to get them on the next flight.

Alternatively, they may prey on your sympathies, telling you a family member or someone else they are responsible for is ill and they need money for medical treatment.

On Thursday 6 May, there are elections taking place:

To elect 15 Basildon Borough Councillors in wards across the borough. These wards include Billericay East, Billericay West, Burstead, Crouch, Fryerns, Laindon Park, Langdon Hills, Lee Chapel North, Nethermayne, Pitsea North West, Pitsea South East, St Martin's, Vange and Wickford North. There is no Basildon borough election in Wickford Castledon and Wickford Park wards.

Elections will take place to elect councillors to a number of Local Councils across the borough. These include Billericay Town Council, Little Burstead Parish Council, Great Burstead and South Green Village Council, Ramsden Bellhouse Parish Council, Ramsden Crays Parish Council and Noak Bridge Parish Council.

To elect nine Essex County Council Councillors to represent the five Electoral Divisions in the borough. These Electoral Divisions are Westley Heights; Billericay and Burstead; Laindon Park and Fryerns; Pitsea; and Wickford Crouch. To elect a Police Fire and Crime Commissioner for Essex Look out for polling cards which will be sent out directly to you from the end of March/early April; providing full details, including the location of your local polling station.

All polling stations will be Covid compliant. Please wear a mask, follow social distancing measures and bring your own pen to polling stations. On Thursday 6 May, the polls will open from 7am and close at 10pm.



HAVE YOU GOT YOUR CENSUS LETTER?

Households across Basildon are being asked to take part in Census 2021.

Census day is on 21 March, but households will now be receiving letters with online codes explaining how they can complete their forms. If you don't get one in the next couple of weeks, please get in touch with the census contact centre. You can also request a paper questionnaire if you'd prefer to complete your census that way.

Local census support centres will be open while the census is happening. Staff will offer help for people not confident online, who don't have a computer or need help completing on paper.

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

FRIENDS OF GLOUCESTER PARK



including woodland rides and natural ponds encourages the widest possible range of woodland creatures. For early risers birdsong welcomes Spring whilst the wood changes with each season. Warmer weather brings a succession of woodland butterflies such as the Speckled Wood as well as dragonflies."

OnSide wants to involve our borough's young people from the very start of its development.



COMMUNITY PROJECT HELPS US REDISCOVER BASILDON'S PAST AND PRESENT

A community project that explores and rediscovers Basildon's nature and heritage with the aim of leaving a lasting legacy in the town is making exciting progress.

The community project is a collaboration between Basildon Council, 10 local primary schools, heritage groups and local people.

The project named 'Radion' after one of the borough's first cinemas, the former Laindon Picture Theatre, began at the start of the year and is part of a drive to help us rediscover our borough and what it has to offer. The project will conclude with two separate digital images being displayed on two sides of a public lenticular screen which will be installed outside the new Empire Cinema in East Square once completed.

To passers-by the screen will appear like an optical illusion which will change and move. Everything on the screens will have come from the workshops and contributions to the project. Children will be able to recognise their own leaf rubbings on the woodland panorama and heritage of the borough past and present will be shared on the other side of the screen.

From its bronze-age beginnings as a marshland settlement to its medieval buildings and church.

Pitsea is now one of the Basildon borough's five major towns with a railway line linking it to the capital in 40 minutes and road links via the A13 and A130 making it a desirable area for those who

But what other facts are there to discover?



Pitsea has an explosive past

Wat Tyler Park was once home to an explosives factory. The Pitsea factory produced dynamite, gelignite and other explosives based on nitroglycerine for blasting rocks and mining. The factory thrived during the First World War but struggled afterwards and closed in 1929.

Then in 1891 the British Explosives Syndicate built a factory in Pitsea.


The Pitsea Explosives Factory mostly made explosives for mining. The factory thrived during the First World War but struggled afterwards and closed in 1929. The Nobel business then went into chemicals becoming a household name as Imperial Chemical Industries (ICI).



Pitsea Mount is home to a 13th century church building

When approaching Pitsea by car or rail it's hard to miss the church tower adorning the town's skyline. The 13th century church of Saint Michael's is one of Pitsea's most beloved and enduring landmarks.

Opposite the railway station in Pitsea Hall Lane is Cromwell Manor, formerly known as Pitsea Hall. This property, which now functions as a wedding venue dates back to the 15th century and still retains many original features.





A 125 acre park named after a famous rebel that is a treasure trove of historical facts

It would be hard to talk about Pitsea without mentioning the jewel in its crown, Wat Tyler Country Park and its surrounds. 125 acres of country walks, wildlife spotting, adventure play for kids and a history of its own.

People have lived in the Pitsea marshes for around 5,500 years, where salt production, fishing and shellfish have helped people earn a living ever since. Sea salt was first made here in the Bronze Age (2500 - 800BC).

In 1381 the men of nearby Fobbing started the Peasant's Revolt. Wat Tyler, one of the revolt's ill-fated leaders was to give his name to the country park for the people of Basildon six conturios later



BASILDON BUDGET 2



This has been a very difficult year for council finances. Recovering from the pandemic is going to take many years. This year, the council has lost £7.2 million in revenue and expenses, combined with £1.6 million required savings.

Just before Christmas, the Government told councils to get the money back through a two percent increase in council tax. I am not prepared to introduce a COVID tax in Basildon so I will be freezing council tax for the second year in a row.

It is important to remember that 70 per cent of the Council tax we pay goes straight to Essex County Council, and a further 15 per cent goes to the police and fire services. That means over

£80 million goes to Essex County Council each year to fix potholes, pavements and provide care services.

This administration has some big ambitions for the year as we bounce back from COVID, including the largest investment in social housing since 1982, clear action on climate change policies including planting 100,000 new trees and the greening of flyovers and the continued regeneration of our town centre. While there are challenges ahead, I believe in Basildon and there will be happier times ahead.



What made you want to become a councillor?

Before becoming a councillor, I was involved in the campaign to save our local libraries from closures. Being involved in this campaign propelled me to do more. I wanted to be proactive in shaping policies that would positively impact the borough and tackle austerity.



Before you became a councillor - did you have a perception of what the role would involve?

My understanding of the role was around shaping policies and setting strategies for the borough, representing my residents and being an advocate for local issues that directly impacted their lives.

And has that view changed at all?

Absolutely. It's been completely different to actually experience the inner workings of the council. Things are very fast paced, just as we witnessed during the first lockdown, when we set up a Community Hub to support our residents within 48 hours.

Since you joined the council, what are you most proud of?

I'm proud of how we've shown throughout this pandemic how closely connected the council is to the needs of the community. I'm proud that we've put £13,000 towards funding library books, of which £1,000 has been allocated to purchase BAME books.

I'm proud that we are bringing a Youth Zone to Basildon which will transform the opportunities our young people have access to and I'm proud that we've set up a mental health fund to support our residents during this challenging time. I'm also proud of the Inclusive Basildon Project, which aims to make the borough more accessible to those with disabilities.

WICKFORD MEMORIAL PARK TO GET 26 ACRE EXTENSION





A Wickford beauty spot is to be extended by 26 acres thanks to an agreement by Basildon Council to manage land previously leased to Beauchamps School as open community space.

Beauchamps School no longer required use of the site which had previously been inaccessible to the public, providing Basildon Council with an exciting opportunity to develop and enhance the biodiversity of the area.

Initial concepts for the site include the creation of a number of wetland ponds, planting of a mixture of woodland and wildflower meadows and the planting of a community orchard.

These ideas will be further developed and defined through engagement with a number of parties, including the Forestry Commission, the Woodland Trust, local expertise, Friends Groups and park users.

The site will be managed and maintained by the council's Parks and Countryside service and will provide important opportunities for the local community to be physically active, connect with others, learn new skills, give to the community and enjoy the outdoors, thus, positively contributing to people's mental health and wellbeing.
