#### Introduction (1) - Objective of the UKSPF Investment Panel

- Objectives of the Panel:
  - Develop & oversee the delivery of the Basildon Borough UKSPF Investment Plan. Need to agree plan (by mid July)!
- Objectives of this meeting:
  - Communicate UKSPF Framework to develop a shared understanding of what is, and is not, fundable.
  - Agree Investment Panel TOR.
  - Discuss and agree the core challenges we are seeking to address
  - **Discuss and agree WHAT we want to fund to address the identified challenges.** Emphasis today is on trying to agree key interventions per priority to develop further
  - Report back on the preliminary discussions with other local authorities about possible collaborations
  - Identify the need/aspiration to develop any bespoke interventions
  - Answer any questions
- Out of scope for this meeting:
  - WHO is best placed to deliver (form follows function!)





## Introduction (2) - overview

- UKSPF is a central pillar of the UK government's Levelling Up agenda.
- Will provide £2.6bn of new funding nationally between October 2022 and March 2025.
- All areas receive an allocation from the Fund not competitive bidding. Basildon allocation is £1,281,877
- The funding is effectively equivalent to the 'match funding' provided previously to EU Programmes.
- Wide partner consultation/involvement expected.
- Collaboration with other Lead Local Authorities is expected.
- Amount of funding will not be sufficient to achieve all goals in framework. We will need to prioritise.
- 4% admin & management fee for the Council. Preference for fewer, larger projects/mainstreaming.
- Requirement to form a UKSPF Investment Panel
  - Produce a UKSPF Investment Plan (by the 1<sup>st</sup> August 2022 deadline latest)
  - Oversee defrayal of funds after the plan has been agreed
- Investment Plan to be agreed by Panel, Lead Local Authority, HMG & Local MPs (& collaborating authorities)
- Predominantly a revenue based fund. Estimated Capital allocation for Basildon is £212,500

### Introduction (5) – collaboration with other areas

- Collaboration across LA's strongly encouraged. Expected to explain approach in Investment Plan
- LA's expected to agree most appropriate scale for each intervention taking account of VfM, effectiveness & current arrangements. N.B. VfM may depend on potential for 'mainstreaming'
- Collaborations can include cross-borough, sub-regional, regional, local or national collaborations
- Joint commissioning people & skills and business support activity strongly encouraged
- Approach should consider current support landscape, 'legacy investments' & different local eco-systems

#### Worked example:

- Assume average allocation at borough and district level £1.1m
- Of the three priorities, assume a third goes to business support £370,000
- Annual funding to be invested per borough £123,000
- Range of support fundable <u>could</u> encompass:
  - Universal 'first stop shop' type services (i.e., Local Growth Hub style support)
  - General & Specialist Advisory Support (i.e., Innovation, Finance, Digital, Low Carbon, Manufacturing, International Trade etc.)
  - General and Specialist Start-Up Support (i.e., Pre-Start Support, Incubation, Acceleration, Innovation etc.)
  - General and Specialist Networking (i.e., Business Networks, Sector Groups, Clusters etc.)
  - Etc. Etc.
- By contrast, overall estimated funding allocation across Greater Essex for business support per annum is £1.7m

# Supporting Local Business Basildon Core Challenges (Evidence Base Under Development)

- Strong economy important for the wealth of the borough and for maintaining employment
- High levels of firm debt, rising business costs and increasing inflationary pressures
- Tight labour market across lots of sectors.
- Insolvencies & Creditors' Voluntary Liquidations (CVLs) are increasing
- Changed consumer behaviours impacting on some key sectors & our town centres.
- Low level of independent retail in some of our town centres
- Companies increasingly moving to hybrid working impact on commercial premises?
- Lack of suitable premises for early stage / service businesses / grow on premises
- Significant manufacturing & professional/scientific industrial base. Needs more support.
- Basildon's industrial base needs renewal. What/who is stimulating new businesses?
- Drive to cut CO2 emissions may present opportunities to reduce costs.

# People & Skills Basildon Core Challenges (Evidence Base Under Development)

- Basildon residents well behind the rest of the UK when it comes to acquiring skills and qualifications.
- One eighth of borough adult residents have no formal qualifications.
- Basildon residents also achieve lower levels of NVQ level 4 qualifications or higher (first degree and above)
- Unemployment rate was 4.3% in 2021, similar to the UK average (4.4%) but above East of England (3.8%)
- Top posted occupations: Care Workers/Home Carers, Nurses, Warehouse Operatives, Health Care Assistants
- Demographic time bomb in many tech orientated sectors in which Basildon is particularly strong.
- Most in demand specialist skills: finance/auditing/accountancy, warehousing, nursing personal care & mental health
- Most in demand common skills: communications, customer service, management, sales, marketing, leadership, planning
- Wards where elementary occupations were most prevalent were: Fryerns (15%), Lee Chapel North (18%),
  Pitsea North West (15%), St Martins (16%) and Vange (17%).
- Wards with the highest proportion of managers, directors and senior officials were: Crouch (15%), Burstead (14%) and Billericay East (14%).
